HOW THE POLL WAS CONDUCTED AND THE MARGIN OF ERROR CALCULATED

February 23, 2020

This CBS News survey is conducted by YouGov online between February 20-22, 2020. A nationally representative sample of 10,000 U.S. registered voters was selected, including 6,498 self-identified Democrats, as well as Independents who plan to vote in the Democratic primary this year.

This sample was weighted according to gender, age, race, and education based upon voter registration lists and the U.S. Census Current Population Survey, as well as 2016 Presidential vote. "General election likely voters" were determined using self-reported likelihood of voting in November. "Democratic primary likely voters" were determined using a model that takes into account self-reported likelihood of voting, along with other individual and aggregate-level factors. Respondents were selected from YouGov's opt-in panel to be representative of all U.S. registered voters. The weights range from 0.2 to 5.0 with a mean of 1 and a standard deviation of 0.6.

The margin of error (a 95% confidence interval) for a sample percentage p based upon the entire sample is approximately 1.2%. The margin of error for a sample percentage p based on the sample of Democratic primary likely voters is approximately 1.7%. It is calculated using the formula

$$\hat{p} \pm 100 \times \sqrt{\frac{1 + \mathsf{CV}^2}{n}}$$

where CV is the coefficient of variation of the sample weights and n is the sample size used to compute the proportion. This is a measure of sampling error (the average of all estimates obtained using the same sample selection and weighting procedures repeatedly). The sample estimate should differ from its expected value by less than margin of error in 95 percent of all samples. It does not reflect non-sampling errors, including potential selection bias in panel participation or in response to a particular survey.
